A Peril of Working at Sea

A recent study* (MARTHA) suggests that the longer maritime workers are at sea, the greater is their fatigue, stress and loss of motivation. Problems build up after six months, which can harm the physical and mental health of the workers. Hours worked each day also affected the outcome.
